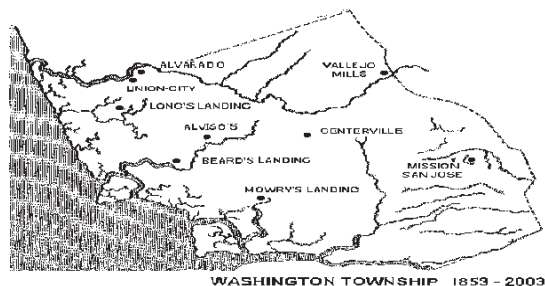

Guest Speaker for January 23, 2012 is Clark Redeker

Clark Redeker graduated from Stanford University in 1940 with a degree in Chemistry. He began work after graduation at Westvaco Chemical in Newark, later acquired by Food Machinery Corporation (FMC Chemical Division). Westvaco was recovering magnesia and other chemicals from Leslie Salt Company's byproduct bitten solutions. Westvaco was the first large scale chemical recycler in the San Francisco Bay Area. Over the years, Clark served as chemist, chief chemist and marketing specialist-magnesia. He later joined Jones Hamilton Company in Newark as Research and Development Chemist.

As a Newark resident he was active in many organizations including Boy Scouts, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Alameda County Fair Board, Alameda County Water District Board and Newark's incorporations Committee. He won election to the first Newark City Council and served nine years, including one year as mayor, when all councilmen were volunteers. He is a long time member of Washington Township Historical Society

News from the Castle, Fall 2011. When the Berkeley City Club was completed in November 1930, the pangs of depression were beginning. Unemployment was on the rise. One of the first meetings hosted by the club, the women made an appeal, “every club woman in the County give employment to at least one man or woman, a day’s employment during the winter month”.

Union City Historical Museum, January 2012. Myrta Raymundo writes, “August May’s Descendants and the Dry Creek Ranch”. August May, a German butcher who sailed around Cape Horn to California in 1852, settled in Alvarado.

Club Car, December 2011. This issue has some beautiful pictures of a trip to the Westside Lumber Company in Tuolumne, taken by Tom Eikerenkotter.

California Historian, Summer 2011, Sierra Wentz writes, “Temples in the heart of man: The debate over the highest use of the Hetch Hetchy Valley and the legislation involved.” Though now flooded, there are still remnants of the once mesmerizing Hetch Hetchy Valley. This was a paper for the National History Day Competition.

The Conference of California Historical Societies is holding their February Symposium in Pasadena on February 23 – 26, 2012. We are members of this organization and encouraged to attend these symposia. Pasadena is famous for its colorful history and the hosting of the Tournament of Roses Parade since 1890, and the annual Rose Bowl football game since 1902. World War II proved to be a boon to Pasadena which brought in high tech manufacturing and scientific companies, notably the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Tetra Tech and Ameron International. They are planning on having a tour of the Rose Bowl and the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals building. This looks to be a wonderful experience.
