## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We are still looking for a new President and a new Vice President. We would also like to get a Membership Chair that can increase our membership. We are looking at placing 11 inch by 18 inch plaques at three places and I would like to thank Tim Swenson for working on this project. I have not heard anything negative about the Pop Goold house so I am assuming that it is still moving forward to be placed on its new location. Several of the Fremont Passport to Adventure sites were presenters at the San Francisco History event earlier this month on a Saturday and Sunday at the Old San Francisco Mint. The California Nursery in Niles is moving forward with a designated location for a nine-thousand square foot museum/interpretive center with a possible second floor that would provide up to 18,000 square feet of space for displays, research and events.

The City of Fremont seems to still want to demolish older buildings and replace them with high density housing much of it too expensive to allow teachers, or city employees to afford. Our meeting this month features my good friend, Margaret Thornberry, who is president of the Fremont Cultural Arts Council. ## Guest Speaker for March meeting, Margaret Thornberry

Margaret Thornberry has been involved with the Fremont Cultural Arts Council for 20 years, the last few as President. The FCAC is a local non-profit umbrella organization for the arts, founded by residents in 1972 to support art and culture in what was then farmland rapidly being transformed into a suburban bedroom community. Ms. Thornberry came to Fremont in 1996 with an eclectic background. Born and raised in a lumber camp and a small town in Southern Oregon, she fell in love with big city San Francisco and the Bay Area at age 12, when she saw her first building over 4 stories tall. As soon as possible she indulged her second passion, travel, living in Spain, and traveling widely while working for an international airline. After starting a family, she accepted a job in the tech industry and settled down (some) in the Irvington District. She is interested in everything, and says she has never felt as much at home as she does in Fremont. She has attended a number of colleges, and along the way gathered a BS from San Francisco State and a Master of Science in Systems Management from Notre Dame de Namur. She loves NPRs Freakonomics broadcasts, and has too many volunteer cats. Her goal for the FCAC is to keep providing services to the arts and the larger community, such as the Focus calendar of arts events, and to arrive at a closer integration between the various arts groups in the area, so that their common interests can be well served.

We received the Spring Newsletter from the **Washington Township Museum of Local History**. They report that they have received some nice donations and are taking weekly tours of school children to the Higuera Adobe. They also mention an Alvarado Walking tour on Saturday, April 15 at 11 AM led by Tim Swenson, meet at the parking lot of Alvarado Elementary School. Also an Irvington Walking tour led by Caroline Harris on Saturday, May 20 at 11 AM, meet at the Irvington Monument.

We received the March issue of **The Club Car** from the Niles Canyon Railway. They tell us that there is a lot of track work going on due to the recent heavy rains which caused rock slides, flooded rail way, trees blown onto the tracks and blocked culverts. They also mention that they have a new Diesel Engine running that was last used when Lyndon Johnson was President. They have worked on this engine for several years and it is now running like a fine watch.

We received the **Union City Historical Museum Newsletter** for February/March 2017. They write about the MLK Day Clean-up the new rain gutters in the Decoto area. **The Washington Township Historical Society By-Laws currently in effect relating to membership dues.** Article VI – Fiscal Year and Dues

Section 1. The fiscal year shall be from January 1 to December 31.

Section 2. Dues of Individual members shall be \$5 for one year; for Family members shall be \$10 for one year; Patron members \$50 for one year; all payable in advance. Individual members whose Dues are not paid by April 1, will be automatically dropped from the membership. Members joining during the last quarter of the year will be paid in full for the following year. Audit of the Treasurer's funds will be conducted by two members at large appointed by the Executive Board at the end of the Treasurer's two-year term.

### MEMBERSHIP

We have not enjoyed the usual membership renewals, and now it is March 2017 and all dues are once again due. It is only \$10, which just barely covers the mailing of this newsletter. While some of you are getting the newsletter digitally by email, most of you are getting it through the United States Postal Service, which means we have to print the newsletter and then mail it. It costs us nearly \$1.00 to print and with postal increase nearly 50 cents to mail that is \$1.50 times six times a year which equals \$9.00 per year. We are fortunate to have the use of the Museum of Local History for our meetings, at no cost, but we have to purchase Liability Insurance for \$400 per year and pay a membership to the Conference of California Historical Societies to be able to purchase this insurance at this rate for \$50 per year. The only way we are surviving now is through the generous donations of some of our members. We will continue to email a digital copy of the newsletter to everyone, but the printed copy will not be mailed if the dues are not paid by May 1, 2017.

This is a fine organization that has been around for over 60 years, and we are doing a good job of informing the community of the historical value in the Washington Township Community.

Please renew your dues and if you have a few dollars extra that would be great to include also with your dues or whenever.
