Guest Speaker Ceal Craig Ph.D. on Drawbridge

Our guest speaker is Ceal Craig, Ph.D. who will be talking about the abandoned town in San Francisco Bay, called Drawbridge. She will also be showing pictures and this presentation will be at the Main Fremont Library on Stevenson Boulevard. This is a free event with refreshments and we hope that you will invite some of your friends. The talk will start at 7:15 PM with a short Washington Township Board meeting then Dr. Craig. We invite you to come early and look at a display set up in the Marks History Room on the second floor of the Main Library on Drawbridge.

September 13, 2016, Tri-City Voice, Pat Kite writes abou "Privet Problems". Privet is a fast growing invasive plant that can be managed but needs very frequent pruning. It also drops little yellow flowers and has little black seeds that go everywhere. Privet was one of the first plants to come from Europe to America and the plant was used for many purposes.

September 13, 2016, Tri-City Voice, Arathi Satish writes about the Arts & Crafts event in Shinn Park organized by Al Minard. Arathi mentions that there will be a STEAM event that will help you make Silly Putty. The Shinn House is one of the Passport to Adventure Historical sites in Fremont, where you can get a Passport to Adventure card or get one punched.

Governor John Bigler signed a bill on April 6, 1853, establishing Alameda County by combining parts of Contra Costa County and Santa Clara County into Alameda County.

November 1, 2016, Tri-City Voice, Kelsey Camello writes about a "historical walking tour of Pioneer Cemetery". This is a free tour of the Irvington Pioneer Cemetery at 41001 Chapel Way in Fremont. Many of the Fremont pioneers were buried in this cemetery.

Thornberry writes about "Discover California Gold in Fremont". Margaret is writing about the California Nursery in Niles. This was the largest nursery on the west coasts of North and South America. Dr. Joyce Blueford is working with the City of Fremont to develop this nursery into a historic park.
