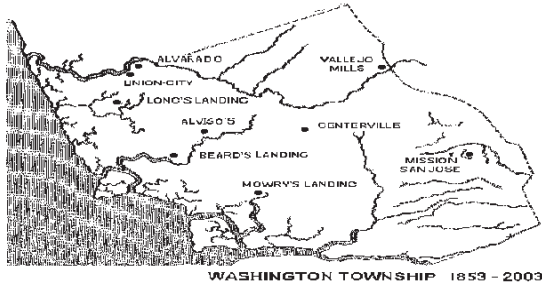

Guest Speaker is Ron Medaglia, the Executive Director of the Pacific Bus Museum. He will share his love of vintage buses. He is also a long time bus driver. The Pacific Bus Museum is one of only about eighth bus museums in the United States. There will be a small display of bus artifacts and memorabilia in the Marks Center for Local and California History.

Tri-City Voice, Tuesday, September 12, Pat Kite writes about Chrysanthemum's. She states that Chrysanthemum is the autumn protest of winter. They come in all colors and are everywhere. Chrysanthemums originated in China and was once the emblem of the old Chinese Army.

Tri-City Voice, Tuesday, September 19, Joyce Blueford writes about the Roeding Centennial Exhibit at the California Nursery. Joyce tells a brief history of the Roeding family and their purchase of the California Nursery in Niles in 1917. The Nursery and the Roeding Centennial Exhibit were opened on September 24 and were open on Sundays through November 15.

The current proposed projects are in the Fremont Hub area that will add a total of 489 housing units, a mixed use area in the Hub that will include a six story building with two floors underground for parking.

The Ohlone Humane Society Wildlife Rehabilitation Center in Newark has had several different types of baby birds brought in to the center to help them be returned to the wild. They had a kindergarten of American crows that many people are not fond of but the American Indians saw the crow as a wise advisor and the spirit of wisdom.

Tri-City Voice, Tuesday, September 26, the Ardenwood Railroad Museum writes about the haunted railroad ride through Ardenwood Farm. Live actors play pirates, cowboys, a witch, and other characters. This is a spooky not scary ride and suitable for all ages. It ran for 6 nights, Friday,

Saturday and Sunday in late October. Think about taking your family on this ride next year.

Visitors were shown examples of baskets, traditional dances, and demonstrations of crafts, informational displays and more. Union City Historical Museum, August/September reports on newly elected officers, with Vice-Mayor, Pat Gacoscos, installing them. Anthony Gualco writes a brief history of Veasy Street in the Alvarado area.

Alameda County Historical Society Quarterly, October 2017, writes about Alfred A. Cohen's Alameda Park Hotel that after it went out of business it became an insane asylum purchased and operated by doctors Joseph C. Tucker and Eustace Trenor. There is also an article on Frederick Krauth Sr., who came to California in 1849 to make a fortune in gold mining, and then went back to New York and brought them out to California where he started Alameda's first newspaper. His son, Frederick Krauth Jr., organized the Alameda Fire Department in 1876.

League of Volunteers (LOV), September/October newsletter informs us of recent

activities, their concert series at Thornton Junior High School, 4357 Thornton Avenue, Fremont: December 10, Holiday Pops with the Newark Symphonic Winds; January 7, 2018, Dan & Laurie, "A Broadway Afternoon"; and others through the year.

Mission Peak Reporter, October/December, lists a calendar of events at the Shinn House, reports on a tea at the Shinn Archive room featuring 95 year-old Mary Torres, who was one of the Rosie the Riveters. They also report on the Roeding Centennial Exhibit at the California Nursery, which opened October 14 and continued on Sundays from 1 PM to 4 PM. They also have the Shinn Christmas Open House schedule: Saturday, December 3, Sunday, December 4, Saturday, December 6, Sunday, December 10 from Noon to 4 PM, and also open on Friday evening, Friday, December 8 from 7- 9 PM.

Enjoy an 1890's Christmas at Shinn House

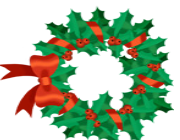
Sat. Dec. 3, Sun. Dec. 4, Wed. Dec 6, Fri.

1251 Peralta Blvd., near Mowry Avenue in Fremont
The House is decorated as it might have been in 1890, including wreaths in every window. Docents will lead tours from Noon to 4 PM on Saturday, December 2, Sunday, December 3, Wednesday, December 6, Saturday December 9, Sunday, December 10, and from 7:00 PM until 9:00 PM on Friday, December 8 2017.

Cost for the tour is \$5.00 for Adults and \$2.⁹⁹ for Children 7-13.
Help make the wreaths on Saturday, November 25, 2017, from 10:00 am until about 2:00 pm. These wreaths will be used to decorate the Shinn House. Wreath making is free unless you want to take one home, then the cost is \$5 but you may only take one after you have made at least one for the house.

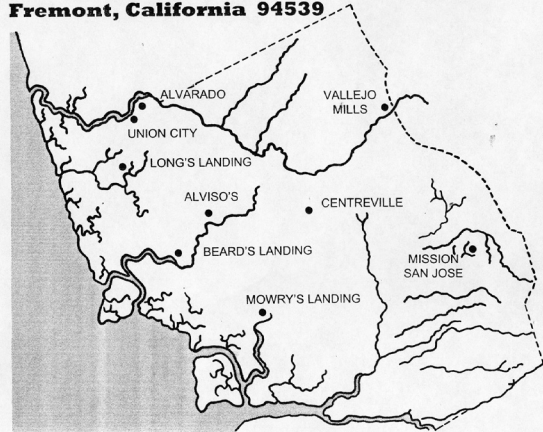
